- A. Agriculture is the backbone of food security worldwide. It directly provides the raw materials for food products that sustain the global population.
 - a. According to the World Health Organization (2022), 828 million people were affected by world hunger in 2021. There is still work to be done to ensure that everyone in the world has access to food.
 - b. Without agriculture, billions of people, especially those in low-income regions, would experience food insecurity.
- B. Stress the importance of the role agriculture serves in developing countries.
 - a. Is the main source of employment, livelihood and income for between 50% 90% of the population in developing countries (Kwa, 2001).
- C. With that being said, one of the biggest threats to food security right now is climate change, as rising temperatures, unpredictable rainfall, and an increase in extreme weather events has decreased crop yields and food productions.
 - a. The Food and Agriculture Organization (2018) predicts that climate change could reduce global food production by as much as 10 percent by 2050.

Transition: In addition to food security, agriculture plays a critical role in driving economic development.

Commented [A3]: In informative speeches, your thesis statement informs your audience what the speech will discuss; it also must serve as a roadmap for the entire speech. You will not add your opinion or persuade your readers.

Commented [A4]: Be sure to verbally tell your audience where you obtained your information from. Your audience should know that you are getting your information from credible and reliable sources.

Commented [A5]: The next paragraphs should follow the same model as above. Provide information from outside sources to inform your readers of your topic.
